


Sugar News spoke with a few of the visibly elated awardees and sought to know what the awards meant to them. individual. It is a collective effort of the department as a whole.

TSALA:

Good morning and welcome to my humble home. Well, my name is Yakubu Tsala, Shettiman Mubi. I was the Executive Secretary of the

National Sugar Development Council (NSDC) from January 2000 to December 2006 after which I decided to resign voluntarily.

Well, I attended the prestigious Ahmadu Bello University, Zaira, Kaduna state where I obtained a degree in Agriculture. I graduated in 1978/79, did my NYSC and later went back to Zaria for a Master dearee in Aaronomy, I began my working career at the Upper Benue River Basin Development Authority. Then I left in 1985 and joined a private firm established by the former Vice President, Alhaji Atiku Abubakar. I had tremendous interest in farming not because of my academic background, but for the fact that the sector had and still has plenty potentials to be harnessed. We were not concerned about financial fulfilment, but more of the satisfaction we derived from seeing our efforts being appreciated.

At some point we sold a bag of maize for 50kobo. There were periods we had excess production and had to transport them to places like Jos, Lafia and other big cities for them to be sold. After a while, I took a break from farming and ventured into partisan politics. Politics has been part and parcel of my existence. I see it as an opportunity to right societal wrongs. My idea of politics is simply to serve and nothing more. My foray into politics dates back to my

I relax very well. Actually, I hardly go out of my house. I spend time holding regular meetings with fellow politicians. Consultation is very important as far as politics is concerned. I usually wake up around 9:am so I go around to greet friends, relations, my senior friends, including my juniors. We discuss economic problems, political problems, and others because this was not how we met Nigeria. I went to the university free of charge. Ahmadu Bello University was the only university in the north at that time. I got married with my scholarship allowance. Immediately I graduated, I started work in August got paid 8,000 and i bought a Peugeot. I was given a brand new land cruiser to work in a farm. I had a house, generator, and everything.

Everywhere I go; we will discuss and encourage the young ones to work hard. I paid my school fees even when I was in primary school. I had to do some labour work to pay my school fees because I went to a missionary school. It was challenging but we were determined to succeed and make the best out of life.
